
Hope, happiness and change

Lawrence N. and Clinton M. are both 12-year-olds who wrote their most recent letters to their UAOCF sponsors when they were fairly new to our program. Each of these children lost both their parents when they were very young. Their letters demonstrate what UAOCF makes possible for Ugandaøs orphans, and how the children themselves experience and feel about this important transition.

Lawrence told his sponsor, õl wouldnøt have made it without you. Your support has saved me from being a street child.ö This is, unfortunately, the fate of many young orphans in Uganda. But for these words to come so matter of

factly from a child, just turning 12 this month, highlights that horrible truth in a way that no official report or newspaper headline ever could.

Clintonøs letter was quite unique; none of our children had ever explained, in such detail, what he experienced when he joined our

program. Here is how he described arriving at his new school: õI was a newcomerí I met friendly people, different teachers and subjects. The weather was not friendly to meí I first

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fell sick but later on I got used to the environment.ö He went on to talk about how friendly and helpful the teachers and other students are. He finished by saying, õAs the term is ending, it was a jolly term for me.ö

Bravo, Clinton! Congratulations on completing your jolly term! His and Lawrence experience is one we hope and intend that all our students share: a new start in a warm and supportive place, one that nurtures the child and encourages success. There may be a few bumps at first as the children adjust to this new environment. We do everything we can to help our children over those bumps and down the road to a successful future. Thank you for making that possible. Lawrence was right: he could not make it without you, nor could any of our children.

Our orphans today, and how we got here

In May, UAOCF & Executive Director visited Uganda for the first time in three years. We took the opportunity to ask Fr. Fred about his visit to Uganda, and how he came to found UAOCF in the first place. Here is Fr. Fred story:

õMy service as a priest in a rural parish in Uganda exposed me to the plight of orphaned children. My heart always went out to them, but I could not do much because there were no resources. I came to the U.S. to study, and on a visit back home, I was surprised that after all the effort by international organizations, rural western Uganda was still left out. An idea to form a charitable organization

õBack in the U.S., a colleague who runs a nonprofit graciously helped me. I looked for volunteers to help develop the foundation; the response was overwhelmingly positive. Iøm ever grateful to all who volunteered to help, in the U.S. and in Uganda. UAOCF owes them everything.ö

During his visit to Uganda, Fr. Fred met with our Uganda-based Oversight Committee as well as some of our orphans. The members of the Oversight Committee volunteer a great deal of their time to the program and display a tremendous sense of commitment. They are truly concerned for the welfare of the children. Fr. Fred visited five schools and reports that the children gratitude is overwhelming. This gratitude generally translates into enthusiasm for learning and success. The children were happy and healthy; see for yourself!

How are we doing?

As of June 6, 2012, UAOCF was supporting 342 children in primary and secondary school, and another ten in technical school or institutions of higher learning.

We request school reports on our students so we can monitor their academic progress. We havenøt yet received all our studentsø most recent grades, but for the 268 whose reports we do have, the results are quite impressive. Most scored in the top half of their classes! And the longer our children stay in the UAOCF program, the better they do: while 70% were in the upper half of their class at the end of 2011, that figure has now risen to 75%. What is even

more exceptional is that 32 of our students scored in the top 10%, and four of these were first in their class. These are wonderful scores for any student but even more remarkable for this group. Before UAOCF, most were in very poor schools (if they attended school at all). They had a lot of catching up to do, but they greed oing it!

For a few of our students, however, catching up has been a challenge. In the last term, three students were singled out as õpoor performers.ö Identifying low performers is the most important reason we monitor grades; we want to help them turn their performance around and succeed.

We are exceptionally proud of

the 34 UAOCF children who have graduated from school. Counting these 34, together with those who have completed or are attending vocational programs and another who started his own business, we have launched 46 children towards a successful future! We never forget that donations from you are what make it all possible. In a world with so much strife and pain, you plant a garden of hope.
